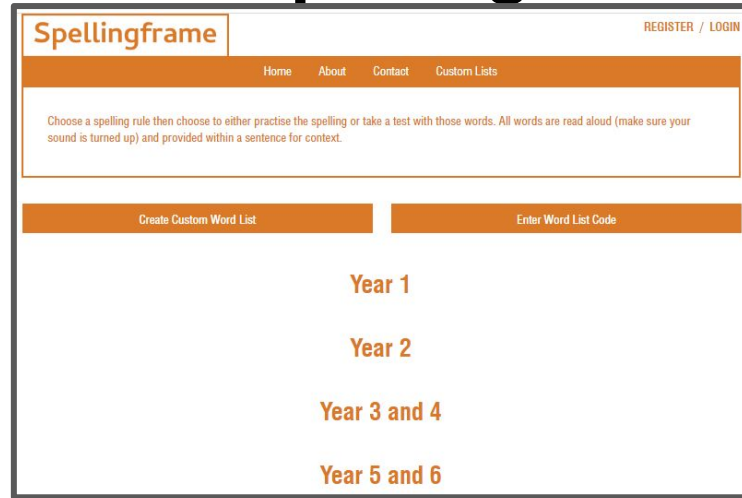

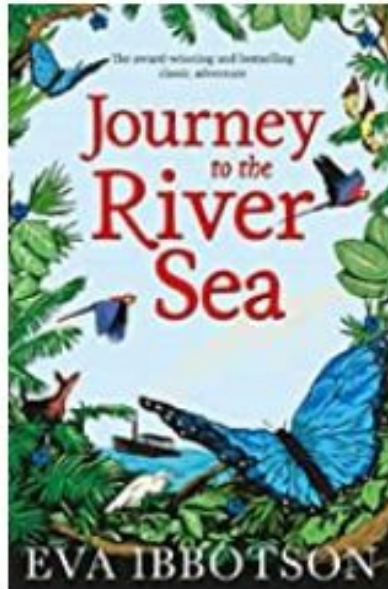

# History - The Victorians



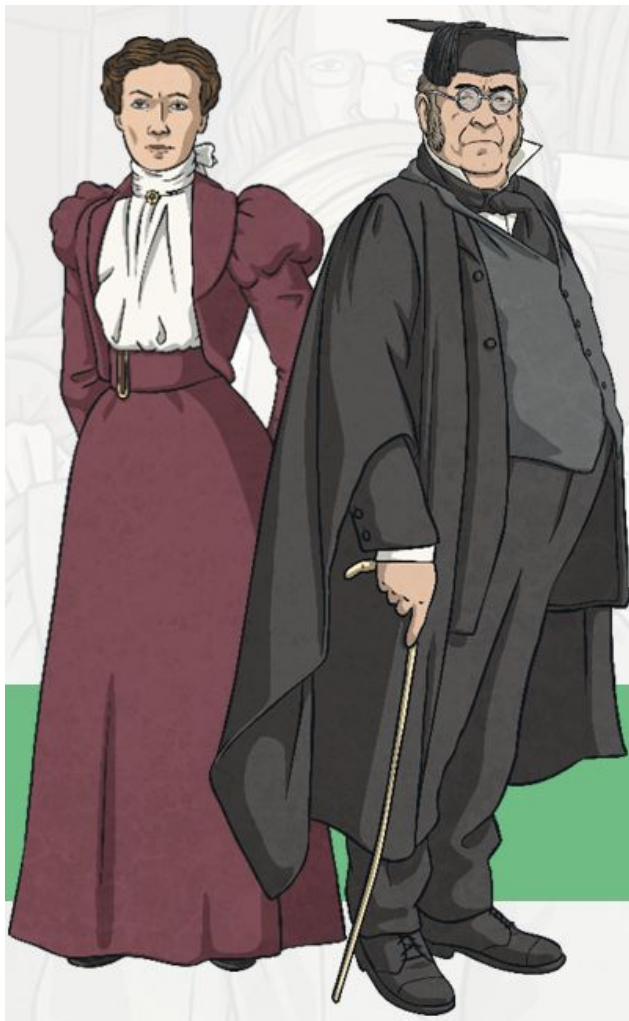
## Schools in Victorian England

### What were Victorian schools like?

Schools in the nineteenth century in Britain were very different from modern-day schools. At the beginning of the Victorian period, only boys from the richest families went to school. Many children had to pay for schooling. However, several laws were passed during the reign of Queen Victoria which meant that schools changed dramatically during the 19th century. By the end of the Victorian era, school was compulsory and free for all children under 12. Find out about the many differences between classrooms then and now, such as writing materials, teachers, punishments and class sizes.
